



Bylaw Enforcement Branch

What Do We Do?

The Bylaw Enforcement Branch helps maintain safety and community standards throughout Regina by ensuring bylaws are followed. This branch primarily contracts work to complete remedies on private properties as part of their enforcement activities.

What Projects are Coming Up?

The Bylaw Enforcement Branch conducts approximately \$2 million in remediation work each year, including yard clean ups, overgrown grass remedies, removing snow, removing graffiti, repairing buildings, removing traffic encroachments and demolitions of structures.

Contracted operations in the Branch are based on individual responses to cases as they arise. They do not schedule specific projects in advance.

What Vendors Does Our Work Require?

The Bylaw Enforcement Branch looks for vendors that support enforcement operations or can complete the remediation work required for each individual case, including uniform and safety equipment suppliers, repair contractors, demolition contractors, grass and snow removal contractors and vehicle towing vendors.

How This Area Works with Vendors

The Bylaw Enforcement Branch's contracted services work with vendors who provide standing contracts which allow the Branch to engage contractors as they require their services.

The Branch requires documentation from contractors, including estimates, cost breakouts for services, final invoices broken out to reflect the services provided and individual invoicing for each property for which work is completed.

We work with vendors who are professional, demonstrate safety practices, supply prompt responses to requests and be flexible to mobilize at short notice.



Facilities and Fleet

What Do We Do?

Facilities consists of four branches responsible for the buildings and sites owned by the City of Regina. Their portfolio includes new construction, renovations, capital replacements, purchasing of new equipment and furniture, maintenance of buildings and sites, day-to-day operations, cleaning and security.

Fleet is responsible for all City owned vehicles and equipment for over 60 branches; responsibilities include vehicle and equipment acquisition, life cycle management, rental acquisitions, maintenance, repairs, commissioning, and decommissioning. In addition, Fleet provides comprehensive equipment and safety training for all City staff.

What Projects are Coming Up?

The Facilities Branches are looking for contractors to supply and install “Avanti” style bus shelters, complete various roof replacements, supply and install construction materials for facility renovations, supply of pool chemicals, lighting replacements, upgrades to fire alarm systems, supply material and labour to support facility shutdown work and to provide materials and labour for service work of HVAC systems.

Fleet routinely manages 35+ projects annually, representing upwards of 120+ individual units of all descriptions used in a municipal

environment. In addition to procuring and managing fleet vehicles and equipment assets, the Branch will be seeking qualified vendors for several procurement opportunities through the end of 2026. Planned tenders include the supply of automotive and industrial batteries, tire supply and repair services and the supply of winter cutting-edge blades.

What Vendors Does Our Work Require?

Facilities and Fleet Branches rely on contractors, vendors and suppliers to execute every responsibility described in the “What Do We Do” section.

How This Area Works with Vendors

This area looks for vendors who follow City specifications, including cleaning supplies, construction materials, furniture, vehicles, equipment and upfitting services.

The Branches require documentation including response for public tenders, direct quotes, Purchase Orders, Worker Compensation Board letter of good standing and clearance, bonding, insurance certificates, service warranties and safety training verification.

The Branch prefers to work with vendors who act with timeliness, communicate clearly, maintain a schedule for their staff and focus on providing quality material at a fair price.



Indigenous Relations

What Do We Do?

The Indigenous Relations Department supports City Council and Administration in incorporating Indigenous worldviews into City work, policies, procedures and operations. The team works across all City departments to advance reconciliation, strengthen relationships with First Nations, Métis and Inuit communities, and supports culturally informed approaches to service delivery and decision-making.

The department provides municipal-wide guidance on Indigenous engagement, cultural protocols, policy development, intergovernmental relations and community collaboration, while supporting initiatives that create a more equitable and inclusive Regina.

What Projects Are Coming Up?

The Indigenous Relations Department is currently supporting and collaborating on a variety of strategic initiatives across the City, including the Indigenous Procurement Policy, Indigenous Cultural Site, kâ-nâsihcikêwin (the City's Indigenous Framework), Mihko Achokos Iskewêw (Red Star Woman) - MMIWG2S+ Art Project, Parks Master Plan, Climate Change Adaptation Strategy, Downtown Revitalization, Centre Square Revitalization and many other major civic projects.

As Indigenous perspectives continue to be integrated into City planning and operations, opportunities will arise for Indigenous

businesses, consultants, facilitators, cultural knowledge keepers and community partners to support project delivery across multiple sectors.

What Vendors Does Our Work Require?

The Indigenous Relations Department works with a diverse range of vendors and partners, including Indigenous-owned businesses, facilitators, community engagement specialists, event and cultural service providers, artists, designers, consultants, researchers, educators, translators, communications professionals and strategic planning experts. The work also requires vendors that support the Cultural Site, which may include traditional catering and cooking services, portable washroom services, cleaning and maintenance services, water delivery and wastewater servicing and propane supply services.

How This Area Works with Vendors

The Indigenous Relations Department values vendors who demonstrate cultural awareness, relationship-building, collaboration and respect for Indigenous ways of knowing. Vendors should be committed to meaningful engagement, clear communication and delivering high-quality services that support reconciliation and community outcomes.

Preference is given to approaches that foster strong partnerships, mutual understanding and inclusive participation, while aligning with the City of Regina's commitment to incorporating Indigenous perspectives into municipal operations and services in Treaty 4 Territory.



Parks & Open Space Services

What Do We Do?

The Parks and Open Space Services Department provides safe, inclusive, sustainable and welcoming parks and open spaces. Many of these spaces are intended to support recreation, sport and culture opportunities that foster pride and wellbeing.

This work is led by three branches, Parks Maintenance, Open Space Services & Cemeteries and Parks Technical Services.

What Projects are Coming Up?

Pending budget approval, the Forestry work unit will be soliciting bids for contracted pruning services in various locations throughout Regina.

Open Space Service will be posting a multi-year Golf Course Services contract professional golf and course booking contract for the 2027 season.

What Vendors Does Our Work Require?

Forestry will require arboriculture companies that are certified to perform pruning services in Saskatchewan.

Golf Course Services contract must be managed by Golf Canada Professionals.

How This Area Works with Vendors

The Department prefers to work with vendors who provide clear communication.

Vendors are encouraged to carefully read the procurement documents to understand the expectations and requirements of each contract.



Roadways & Transportation

What Do We Do?

The Roadways & Transportation Department builds, operates and maintains Regina's transportation infrastructure to ensure it is safe, reliable and accessible. Our assets include roads, alleys, bridges, sidewalks, traffic signals, traffic signs and winter maintenance operations that support the movement of people and goods throughout the city.

What Projects are Coming Up?

The Roadways & Transportation Department will begin procuring several projects for the 2027 construction season this fall and winter, including intersection improvements, roadway infrastructure upgrades, traffic signal construction, construction material supply contracts, and integrated projects that combine water, roadway and sidewalk renewals.

What Types of Vendors Do We Work With?

The Roadways & Transportation Department partners with vendors and contractors to build, maintain and improve Regina's transportation infrastructure. Opportunities include road and sidewalk construction, road and sidewalk repairs, traffic signal construction, pavement marking, tree trimming, heavy equipment services and the supply of concrete, asphalt and other construction materials.

How We Work with Vendors

We value vendors who prioritize safety, quality and customer service. Our preferred partners communicate proactively, accommodate residents and stakeholders, provide innovative solutions, minimize project impacts and deliver work safely, on time and on budget. Vendors should maintain appropriate certifications, insurance and documentation while meeting or exceeding industry standards.



Sustainable Infrastructure

What Do We Do?

The Sustainable Infrastructure Department provides long-term and current planning and design for infrastructure projects, as well as field inspections, surveying, locates, drafting, heritage sensitive standards and geospatial services.

What Projects are Coming Up?

In addition to several infrastructure projects, the Sustainable Infrastructure Department is working on a corporate asset management plan and studies related to infrastructure standards and policy.

What Vendors Does Our Work Require?

The Sustainable Infrastructure Department works with engineering consultants, engineering contractors, software vendors and geospatial professional consultants/developers.

How This Area Works with Vendors

The Sustainable Infrastructure Department prefers to work with vendors who offer professional services and expertise, including knowledge of mapping, surveying and drafting standards as well as civil, structural and municipal engineering.

Vendors should also be able to provide engineer stamped drawings, proof of permission to consult and normal liability, surety and bonding insurance.



Water, Waste & Environment

What Do We Do?

The Water, Waste & Environment Department delivers reliable sustainable water and waste services for our community, protecting public health and safety, property, and the environment.

The department manages stormwater collection and flood control, collects and treats wastewater, supplies and distributes water, ensures environmental compliance and diverts, collects and disposes of waste and recycling.

What Projects are Coming Up?

Upcoming projects are related to water and wastewater infrastructure repair and construction, water and wastewater processing including projects related to the Wastewater Treatment Plant, as well as work related to organic processing and waste management.

Two major initiatives include:

Small Diameter Water Main Renewal

- ~1.1 km of small diameter water replacement by open trench including paving, curb, gutter, and sidewalks.

Lead Service Connection Management Program

- Hydrovac Packages - Several packages to confirm water service connection material by hydrovac at various locations
- Replacement Packages - Several packages to replace City-side lead service connections at various locations.

What Vendors Does Our Work Require?

Vendors are required for all parts of the Department's work, including heavy equipment hourly contracts, construction and design consultants, underground infrastructure and surface infrastructure to operate the City's organics and recycling programs.

How This Area Works with Vendors

The Water, Waste & Environment Department prefers to work with vendors that provide consistent quality, timely deliveries, competitive pricing, open communication and a commitment to sustainability and innovation.
