The audio system has also been upgraded, and will feature 12 speakers along with two subwoofer boxes.

The chief operating officer said renovations are on track. He expects the cinema will be ready to play its first show sometime in mid-June, but the lobby, concession and washrooms are expected to remain under construction until early July.


The first movie shown on the new laser system is meant to be Wings Over Water, a documentary about wetlands on the Prairies.

The new projectors are already sitting in the projection room and dwarf the theatre's old 15/70mm film workhorses, which themselves are massive. Four chillers, each roughly the size of a household central air conditioning unit, will keep the new laser projectors from overheating. The coolant lines have yet to be installed.

While Holota wouldn't specify how much all the upgrades will cost the theatre, he said an "adopta-laser" fundraiser is underway, with the hope of bringing in \$1 million.

This, he said, would not cover the entire cost, but would be a "great help."

Olymel to reduce hog production in region

SASKATOON Canadian meat producer and processor Olymel says it is reducing hog production in Western Canada amid financial losses and uncertainty in hog and pork markets, which has resulted in 80 layoffs.

The company said in a media release Friday that it is closing five sow units in Alberta and one in Saskatchewan, which will reduce its western sow herd to 40,000 from 57,000 sows in production.

Olymel said the barns would months and will remain closed until market conditions improve.

In the release, CEO Yanick Gervaiss said Olymel has experienced

"significant" losses in fresh pork production as a result of limited market access globally.

"Now coupled with stubbornly high feed costs resulting in unprecedented losses in the hog sector we have little choice but to retract and position ourselves for success in the future when conditions improve," he said in the release.

Although the closures will mean a net reduction of about 200,000 market hogs to its slaughter plant in Red Deer, Alta., from compabe wound down over the coming ny-owned farms, Olymel said the effect won't be felt until 2024 at the earliest and will be subject to independent hog supply availability.
